# Winter Gardening

Even though Winter is upon us and the days are short, there are still enough hours in the day for tidying and preparation for springtime, so long as we can keep off the soil. I have been fairly busy in the vegetable plot over the last couple of months. The vegetable



concerned that the runner beans may not be as productive in the no-dig bed, as there will be no trench prepared for them.

I prefer preparing the vegetable plot in Autumn rather than in February/March as the ground is drier and can be worked without fear of compaction, and it also gives plenty of time for the worms, etc. to draw the compost down into the ground where it is needed. I was given this tip by Ted Gill, a long serving member of our society.

r the last couple of months. The vegetable plot has three separate beds and one has been designated to be a no-dig bed. I cleared the bed of weeds, raked it level and spread a three inch layer of compost. For the two remaining beds I dug them over to one spit deep, and spread a similar three inch layer of compost to each of the two beds.

I intend planting small areas of similar vegetables in each bed, i.e. beetroot, onions, runner beans, lettuce and radish, and then compare the produce over the Summer. I am



One of the positives for this December is a basket in my garden that is still in full bloom. The white and lilac bacopa are magnificent. When we have heavy frosts I will cut the bacopa back, but it should survive the Winter and regrow in the Spring.

# Getting Ready for the New Year

Those of you who have heard me going on about whether to dig up my dahlias, as I have always done, and which most books recommend even in these days of warmer winters, may be interested to know that I have finally decided to cut the haulms down and leave them in the ground. Then chuck some compost over the top and plant wallflowers in between . They are looking quite good and seem to have survived the transport from the allotment to my garden. I have disturbed a few bulbs in the process but I think they will recover.

Another joy at this time of the year is that, despite the internet, seed companies are sending out magnificent catalogues. It can bring a real bit of colour and optimism to a cold winter evening to sit and imagine how your garden might look if you were to buy a few of these smashing seeds and plants. In years gone by the fantasy reading at this time of year was the travel brochure but we know what happened to that! Just cast your mind back to the early spring. During the first lockdown seeds were in short supply and compost deliveries were erratic. So lets all be prepared this time round.

However, just a few words of warning. If you have one, look in your seed tin and see how many packets are still there from previous seasons. If you didn't use a whole packet there may be enough there to see you through the season as long as there is enough to cope with a poorer germination rate. However if you have saved a couple of seeds from a packet of five do you really want to rely on the germination of two seeds? By the time its obvious nothing is coming up it's a bit late to try to get a fresh packet. Who knows what is likely to happen?

So keep warm, have fun planning and hoping for a little bit of light at the end of the tunnel. Let's just hope it's not something coming the other way!

Heather has been doing a horticulture course and has offered to produce some designs for any member who is going to revamp their garden. I am in that position and will hopefully be taking advantage of her offer when I move house. I already have some ideas and I have been buying some plants ready and here I like to use a local family owned firm rather than these huge national chains so I unhesitatingly endorse Elmsley Nurseries for plants and compost and excellent service.
