## **Dear Members**

September is upon us and the nights are drawing in and temperatures are falling. Our Summer is passing and early Autumn is here.

It is very important to continue dead-heading annuals e.g. cosmos, lavatera, marigolds and tithonia to extent their flowering until late October. Similary dahlias need daily dead heading to prolong them flowering until the first frosts appear.

The vegetable patch has done very well this year with good yields of runner beans, onions. beetroots, garlic, sweet peppers and outdoor tomatoes. On the downside I don't have much luck with lettuces, I have a glut of them in Spring and early Summer, but I cannot get lettuce seeds to germinate when the temperature rises in Summer. I would welcome any advice. It may be an idea to have a meeting to discuss our failures and successes in the growing season. We may be able to resolve our problem plants for next year.

The dreaded tomato blight has appeared this week in my garden. I have been cutting back the infected leaves daily and hope that the green tomatoes will ripen, or I will have to take the tomatoes off the plants to ripen on a window sill.
